God's Work Our Hands is a day of service designated by the ELCA. It will take place on September 9, 2018. What a wonderful way to start the fall, the new school year and all the other amazing events until the end of the year!

The Congregation Life Committee would like your input into St. Paul's Day of Service. On <u>August 19, 2018 following the church service</u>, you will get to vote on one of these three projects.

<u>Project One</u>: A Chemo Care Bag. The bag will contain sanitizer, hard candy, a Port pillow for the seat belt, tissues and other items. We will make the Port pillows, assemble the bags and deliver to Chemotherapy Sites.

<u>Project Two:</u> Police Appreciation Bag. The bag will contain drinks, healthy snacks, sanitizer, tissues and notes of thankfulness for their service. We will assemble the bags, write the notes and deliver to State Troopers, Sheriff Department and Police Stations around Frederick County.

<u>Project Three:</u> Homeless Kits. We will stuff socks with sample sized shampoos, soap, toothpaste and brush and various other items. We will stuff the socks and request members to take them with them, leave them in their car and distribute them as they see someone in need.

Pastor's Pen

For our summer newsletter I would like to share some observations from this year's Delaware Maryland Synod Assembly, held in Hunt Valley, MD on May 31 to June 2. I had the privilege of attending the assembly with St. Paul's representative, Mr. Gary Wachter. Gary attended assembly all three days, while I attended only two days, since I spent June 2 in Walkersville blessing bikes as part of St. Paul's Strawberry Festival.

Throughout the assembly we heard reference to a new book by Rev. Tod Bolsinger entitled, "Canoeing the Mountains". The

book tells the story of two American adventurers, Meriwether Lewis and William Clark. Remember learning about those fellows in high school? They were appointed by Thomas Jefferson to explore the newly acquired Louisiana Purchase in 1804. And the expedition was built on a completely false expectation. Lewis and Clark believed, like almost every other white person of their day, that the unexplored west contained the same exact geography as the familiar east. So they packed up all their gear, got in their canoes and headed up the Missouri River. The carried their canoes up Lemhi Pass, and instead of the river they expected to see, the river they assumed would carry them to the Pacific Ocean, they found the Rocky Mountains. They needed to exchange their canoes for horses and adapt to an "off the map" kind of life.



I found the story fascinating, and without reading the book (but I certainly plan to read the book) I see the story as a parable for my life as a pastor. When I attended seminary almost half a century ago I was trained in all the skills necessary for supporting faith in a Christian culture (remember when newspapers contained daily Bible readings? (remember newspapers?).) Accordingly, I was highly trained as a teacher to provide Christian education to children and adults that attended church, a liturgist to lead Christian worship services in a culture that "went to church" on Sundays and a pastoral care giver to provide Christian counsel and support most often to church goers but once in a great while to people not affiliated with any particular church.

That culture has changed dramatically, and the challenge for pastors and parishioners today is not so much to perfect teaching skills or sing the notes on key in worship services as it is to reach people with the good news of Jesus Christ in a culture where 23% of the population now has no religious affiliation. The territory we expected to see in 2018. We are "off the map".

What do we need to take with us in this new territory? What do we need to let go of? That's not to say all the skills I learned in seminary and all the cherished faith, wisdom and spiritual formation you and I received in church are to be thrown away. Heaven forbid we lose this treasure given to us. Indeed, the faith, leadership, skills you and I learned "on the map" are what we must take with us as we venture "off the map".

I find myself asking questions like, "Do I have faith enough in Jesus to venture into our new culture, seeing it as an 'adventure' more than as a trial or adversity?", "Do I love Jesus enough to risk failure as I myself adapt my leadership perspectives and skills?", and "How much must I be willing to let go of so that my hands are empty enough to grab the things God might want to give me, things that I cannot yet see?

Accordingly, at Synod Assembly we also saw evidence of our synod continuing to do some things well that it has always done well. A progress report was made on three new mission starts in our synod (Global Peace Multicultural Fellowship which meets at Evangelical Lutheran Church in Frederick, "The Slate Project" — which is an online and face to face church community that meets in the Episcopal Cathedral in Baltimore, and "The Church on the Square", a joint mission start with the Episcopal Diocese of Maryland). We heard a progress report on "Forward in Faith", our synod's commitment to the ELCA's national campaign. The congregations of our synod adopted "Forward in Faith" a few years ago. Our synod signed on to provide \$2.5 million dollars by 2018. Guess what? So far, we have received \$3.2 million dollars!!! We also dealt with several resolutions. We adopted a resolution for a Synod Opioid and Addiction Team. We debated but did not adopt a resolution on gun violence.
