St. Paul's ELCA Women have sent stamps (on cover) to the National Lutheran Home in Rockville for many years. Often we received envelopes from a CPA delivered to us by Doris Alexander, plus some from other members.

Recently several large quantities of covers with stamps from someone were received (a mystery.) Then some happened to be delivered by Kay Wachter. (Mystery solved!) The envelopes have stamps not previously seen in this area but with lovely, commemoratives and from every state in the U.S. All of these will be prepared and sent with others going to the National Lutheran Home this fall.

The stamp program at "The Home" has been in existence for 42 years and has been recognized for its ministry to its residents. The stamps get prepared, sorted and sold to stamp dealers and the proceeds benefit the residents. We, at St. Paul's, have been thanked by letter from the Stamp Program Chairman for our past contributions and I am sure they will be especially pleased with our next contribution.

They prefer United States commemoratives or foreign stamps (all need to be on at least 1/2 of the envelope so elderly hands can work on them.) Picture postcards are appreciated also.

Everyone is busy and everyone has things they would rather do but think about this - Imagine what it would be like if your child needed an article of clothing and the only place you could afford to get it was at the clothes closet? Pastor's Corner

One of my heroes has always been Albert Schweitzer. Somehow when the red worship book (Evangelical Lutheran Worship) replaced the green worship book (Lutheran Book of worship), Schweitzer's commemoration day didn't make it into the new book. But we used to, at least, commemorate this man on September 4. And since I am writing this article for the September newsletter, I find myself thinking of him.

Schweitzer, known as a theologian, philosopher, organist, authority on the works of J.S. Back, physician, and missionary to Africa, was born on January 14, 1875, the oldest son of a Lutheran pastor in Alsace, which is in modern day France. He studied philosophy and theology at the University of Strasbourg. In 1899 he received his doctorate in philosophy and became a lecturer at the university and a preacher at St. Nicholas Church. The following year he was ordained a Lutheran pastor and received his doctorate in theology. He studied the organ and even wrote a book on the life and art of Bach.

In 1905 Schweitzer announced his intention to become a missionary doctor. He resigned his university appointments and abandoned a promising career as a lecturer. In 1912 he married Helene Bresslau, a scholar and a nurse. In 1913 he received his doctorate in medicine and on Good Friday of that same year, he and Helene set out for Lambarene in Gabon. There they built and opened a hospital on the banks of the Ogooue River.

When World War I broke out, Schweitzer was interned as an "enemy alien" and held as a prisoner in France. While there, Schweitzer pondered world problems and wrote a two volume set of philosophy, <u>The Philosophy of Civilization</u>. In it he set forth his principle of reverence for life in all of its many forms which he believed was essential for the existence and survival of civilized society. After the war ended, he returned to Africa in 1924 to rebuild the ruined hospital, to which was added a leper colony. In 1952 Schweitzer was awarded the Nobel Prize for Peace for his work on "the Brotherhood of Nations". He continued to write and lecture even as he worked in Africa. In addition to his work in philosophy, Schweitzer is known as the father of the study of "the historical Jesus", through which he sought to uncover and know more fully the person of Jesus behind the preconceptions and assumptions that we have through culture. He died on September 4, 1965 and was buried at the hospital beside his wife.

We can learn from Albert Schweitzer that our work which may seem mundane and done in out of the way places, has significance and is the open door through which God's graces are manifested in us. And that as



we draw nearer to Jesus, his grace will fill us and cause us to be more engaged with the world, not less. And finally, that Jesus – the object of our affection, transcends one aspect of our lives, to encompass every part and facet of our being. Love of Jesus will pull us through a merely theoretical relationship with Jesus and into concrete expressions of our love and his grace.
