# Consecration Sunday is Coming! October 28, 2018

Congregations that approach financial stewardship from a biblical perspective do not view the money Christians give to their church merely as a way to pay its bills. Rather, such congregations see financial contributions as a way to help people grow spiritually in their relationship to God by supporting their church's mission and ministry with a percentage of their incomes.

Our congregation's finance committee has selected the New Consecration Sunday
Stewardship Program as a way to teach the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving in our stewardship education emphasis this year.

New Consecration Sunday is based on the biblical philosophy of the need of the giver to give for his or her own spiritual development, rather than on the need of the church to receive. Instead of treating people like members of a social club who should pay dues, we will treat people like members of Jesus Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of discipleship. New Consecration Sunday encourages people toward proportionate and systematic giving in response to the question, "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?" During morning worship on Consecration Sunday, we are asking our attendees and members to make their financial commitments to our church's missionary, benevolent, and educational ministries in this community and around the world.

Every attendee and member who completes an Estimate of Giving Card does so voluntarily by attending morning worship on Consecration Sunday. We urge people to attend who feel strongly opposed to completing a card. The procedure is done in such a way that no one feels personal embarrassment if he or she chooses not to fill out a card.

We will do no home solicitation to ask people to complete cards. During morning worship, our guest leader will conduct a brief period of instruction and inspiration, climaxed by members making their commitments as a confidential act of worship.

We will encourage participation in Consecration Sunday events through the Consecration team and Council. Since we will make no follow-up visits to ask people to complete their cards, we will make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend Consecration Sunday worship.

### Pastor's Pen

"For we hold that a person is justified by faith apart from works prescribed by the law."

Strong words from a man of faith – the man for whom this congregation is named as well as the man who inspired Luther to speak out against the prevailing theology of the church of his day, bringing about what we know today as the "Lutheran" Church.

October is a month of significance for those of us here at St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church in the heart of Walkersville. For every October, we remember that it was Luther's discovery of what the Apostle Paul was saying in his letter to the Christians in Rome about the importance of faith (as well as what he said in other letters to the Christians in Galatia, Ephesus, Philippi and Colossae, and to the young evangelist Timothy) that touched off Luther's personal reform as well as the reform that has spread across the entire Christian Church on earth. And it was all over the issue of the importance of faith.

But while faith is easy to talk about and easy to plug into doctrines, it is a nebulous thing to get a good grasp of.

Oftentimes we think of it as merely an assent to certain statements – statements that our reason tells us are true. But faith is more than that; it is the ability to continue believing that something is true, even when our reason is attacked and battered by fears and doubts and starts to waver. As C.S. Lewis put it in his book, *Mere Christianity*, "...faith...is the art of holding on to things your reason has once accepted, in spite of your changing moods." And I don't have to elaborate on how fickle and shifting our moods can be.

I am reminded of another book – a book entitled, *Mother Teresa:*Come be my Light. This book revealed, to the astonishment of many, that for more than fifty years the celebrated Albanian born nun actually doubted the very existence of God. That is, for most of the time that she ran the Sisters of Charity – the mission in Calcutta, India that cares for the poor, the desperate, and the suffering – Mother Teresa struggled with her own faith in God.

Faith is a gift of God. Without it there would be no life. And our work, to be fruitful, and to be all for God, and to be beautiful, has to be built of faith. Faith in Christ who has said, I was hungry, I was naked, I was sick, and I was homeless, and you ministered to me! On these words of His all our work is based.

Commentator Sandip Roy, an editor with New America Media in San Francisco, grew up in Calcutta and attended a Jesuit missionary school there. He met Mother Teresa as a schoolboy on outings to the orphanages and homes for the dying run by her Sisters of Charity. He recalls, "Mother Teresa seemed to gather the poverty and disease that swirled around us into the folds of her sari; and for a moment she let it actually touch our lives." He says he is not completely surprised that some of the newly published letters from Mother Teresa to the same priests he knew in Calcutta reveal her spiritual doubts. "But," he says, "the true miracle of Mother Teresa was that, in the midst of her own crisis of faith, she gave *us* faith. She taught even little, sheltered kids like us to see how desperate other people's lives were *and to care!*"

Isn't that really the true nature of faith – a nebulous "thing" that keeps us going in the right direction, despite the fact that our questions and doubts are attacking us. And is it really so surprising that the people we recognize as "pillars of faith" actually had to struggled with their faith throughout their lifetimes? Even Martin Luther was reported to have thrown an inkwell at the devil during one of his struggles (though it was a chamber pot that he actually threw). And, of course, we know from Acts and some of his letters that the Apostle Paul's faith was actually made tougher and stronger throughout the battering it had to go through. So, as we enter this Reformation month, let's remember that the faith that we actually do have isn't the result of something we have done, but is a gift from God - a gift freely given by a gracious God, and worked in us by the merciful God who loves and redeems us from sin, death, and the power of the devil. God bless you as you "wrestle" with your saving faith.
