Lap Quilt Ministry

Over the last few months, you may have read in the bulletin requests from the Congregational Life Committee for sewing supplies to make lap quilts and wondered what, pray tell, is a lap quilt. Wonder no longer. A lap quilt is a simple patchwork quilt intended to keep someone's lap warm in a drafty room. Each quilt is about 38 by 31 inches, perfect for a wheelchair.

This is a service project, not a fundraiser. We do not sell these quilts, even to raise money with which to sew them. We use new donated materials and, after a blessing, donate the finished product to those in need. So far, we have made 100 quilts to donate to Frederick hospital and 50 for the Youth's "Go Bag" project. Fifty were blessed in February and 100 more will be blessed on June 6.

To continue this Ministry, we need a steady stream of donations including:

Lightweight woven cotton fabric (the texture and weight of a bedsheet). Print or solid color, any size. Remnants larger than 6 x 7 inches are fine. Fabric can be inexpensive, but must be new or unused. Walmart sells cotton fabric for less than \$5/ yd. and secondhand stores (such as Goodwill—check the linen aisle) sell odd pieces of new yardage for very little. (No children's fabric at this time, please.)

Low-loft quilt batting. (Lg. size at Walmart \$10.)

New bedsheets (for backing). Any size or color, fitted or flat.

Thread. White, off-white, black or *any color at all! Clean out the oldies in your sewing box; it—and we—will thank you.*

Monetary donations. Put a check in the offering plate or get it to the Church Office, or donate online (use the "undesignated" option). In all cases, *put* "*quilts*" *on the memo line for proper routing*.

Volunteers to assemble quilts at home. Materials and/or instructions available upon request.

To donate items or volunteer, contact Kate Stottlemyer or call the Church Office to make arrangements. Thank you.

This event was an opportunity to show our community we are still a viable congregation in good times and difficult times and that St. Paul's is here to continue supporting our community.

PASTOR'S PEACE

"Jesus said to him, "If you want to be perfect, go, sell what you have and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow Me." Matthew 19:21

The definition of benevolence as described by Merriam Webster is a disposition to do good, an act of kindness, or a generous gift. Since my arrival here, I have seen many examples of benevolence by our members, our Council, and our staff. Each month the Congregational Life Committee makes a recommendation to the Council for the disbursement of \$100 to be given to a local entity doing God's work in our community. Over the last year the Council has approved benevolence to Walkersville Safe and Sane, Frederick County Humane Society, The Religious Coalition (Linton Cold Weather Shelter, and SHIP (Student Homelessness Initiative Partnerships) just to name a few. Additionally, the Council designates \$100 per month to Glade Valley Community Services to support their various activities in our community. We also house the Glade Valley Thrift Shop at no cost to them. Just recently, the Council approved a \$2000 gift of benevolence to support the Hayward Road Family Shelter as part of a challenge that was issued to the DE/MD Synod Frederick Conference of Lutheran Pastors.

Over the last few years, St. Paul's has been blessed with the benevolence of many of its parishioners. Significant gifts have been made to sustain our church far beyond the life of those who have made those gifts. Esther Filler and Margaret Powers are two of those benefactors who have gifted significant memorials to St. Paul's for the organ project, heating and cooling bills, and for the upkeep and maintenance of our buildings. It is through their benevolence that we have been able to undertake many projects within the last year and we are ever grateful for these gifts. Perhaps you will find a way to make a continued gift of benevolence to St. Paul's to support our church and the activities we promote. When you decide you are prepared to remember your church in your life planning, we can provide you with the information and resources necessary to do so. I believe we were told during one of our stewardship campaigns that a "giving church is a growing church" and I definitely see we are growing.

Under Belinda's direction, we maintain a connection with the Frederick Soup Kitchen to provide a meal about once a quarter to those who are struggling to make ends meet. This benevolence also allows for the staff at the soup kitchen to take a breather from the daily meals they provide. St. Paul's sponsored several food drives over the last year and we participated in the Annual Stocking Stuffer Event in conjunction with other neighbors in Walkersville. St. Paul's is active in our community and there is probably a whole lot more we could do for our neighbors in the area. Are you aware of an entity that would benefit from our benevolence and how is it that you can be involved? We are seeking opportunities to minister and be with those who are our siblings in Christ, those who may just need a bit of assistance to move forward, and those with whom we can share the core of our logo "Cultivating and Nourishing Mind, Body, and Spirit."

Now is our opportunity to have our voices heard throughout the community and share our faith as Peter did on the first Pentecost. Though in most circumstances, actions speak louder than words. Our outreach on May 15 brought a lot of joy to our congregation and our community. I believe St. Paul's was extremely successful in ministering, witnessing, and loving our community during our recent Strawberry Festival. I am thankful for all of the volunteers who spent countless hours preparing, baking, and setting up the Festival and to those for their work on the yard sale. I look forward to exploring new ways to be servants with you in our church and perpetuating our benevolence for generations to come..
