All About Quilts!

The Strawberry Festival has come and gone and so has the Quilt Sale until Christmas. This year, we sold 2 twin-size quilts (\$20 each), 3 mini quilts (\$10 each), and \$27 in Raffle tickets. The Raffle quilt winner was Celeste McLeish, a WHS Jazz Band mom. The quilts we've raffled have been made by Quilt Ministry from donations of vintage quilts tops or hand-stitched vintage quilts squares we've machine-stitched together, and "upcycled" (second hand) sheets and new batting. At this point, we have no unfinished vintage projects left for the next Raffle. If you have—or know someone who has—such a thing laying around and lonesome, we'd be delighted to give it a life.

God is generous! This past winter, Quilt Ministry was blessed with several sizeable donations of fabric, and we are most grateful. We'd like to thank everyone who dug into closets and drawers, stuffed their findings into boxes and bags, and lugged them to the Church Office. Special thanks to Dale Long, Kay Wachter, Billie Jo Kahler and a friend of Phyllis Dobson. Together, their donations produced over 75 twin quilt tops and several backs. We also thank Kay Wachter's sister, Shirley Eshelman, for 10 adorable hand-made fleece throws of various sizes.

At Worship on Sunday, May 18, we blessed 51 twin-size quilts, 3 mini quilts, and 10 fleece throws. We have a few places who gratefully accept our quilt donations, but we're always looking for more. If you know of any reasonably local (for easy pick-up/delivery) organization—or a family who might be down on their luck—that might be interested in children's quilts, please contact Kate or the Church Office. A note on acquiring quilts: There is no charge for a quilt to be given as a ministry to someone in need. For one to be kept or given as a gift, we do ask for a donation to defray the cost of materials. A twin quilt using purchased materials costs about \$13.50 to make. Contact Kate to check availability.

We thank you for your generous support and welcome your help in the future. *How can you help?*

- 1. Prayers—We can do nothing without God's blessing and aid.
- 2. Sewing—No cutting or designing required. All you need is a sewing machine and thread (any color(s)—it won't show). See Kate for details.
- 3. Knotting—It's easy! If you can tie your shoe, you can knot a quilt. Check the Bulletin for dates.
- 4. Donations of fabric (scraps are okay), new or "gently used" sheets in children's prints or bright solids, and low-loft quilt batting.
- 5. Donations of cash for purchasing supplies (especially batting). Clearly label your donation "quilts".

No child should go to sleep cold. These quilts warm the body and comfort the soul, thereby fulfilling St. Paul's Mission Statement: Through Christ, we joyfully feed the body, mind and soul of all.

Pastor's Peace

"He has saved us and called us with a holy calling, not according to our works, but according to his own purpose and grace, which was given to us in Christ Jesus before time began." 2 Timothy 1:9

As summer begins and many of us look forward to vacations or time off, it's a good moment to reflect on something we often take for granted: work. Not just our jobs, but the work we do at home, in our communities, and even here in our church. Why do we work? What is its place in the life of a Christian?

Martin Luther had much to say about work. In fact, he saw work not simply as a way to earn a living, but as a vocation, a calling. Whether we are farmers, teachers, engineers, parents, students, or retirees, Luther taught that our daily tasks are holy when they are done in faith and in service to others.

Work, in this view, is a means through which God provides for the world. He feeds the hungry through farmers and grocery clerks. He heals through doctors and nurses. He builds through architects and carpenters and yes, He comforts and encourages through teachers, counselors, and even a kind word from a neighbor. Your work, whatever it is, matters deeply because through it, God is at work. The Apostle Paul puts it this way in Colossians 3:23–24: "Whatever you do, work heartily, as for the Lord and not for men, knowing that from the Lord you will receive the inheritance as your reward. You are serving the Lord Christ."

This doesn't mean that work will always be easy or enjoyable. Sometimes our jobs feel more like toil than joy. But even then, the Gospel reminds us that our worth is not based on our productivity or success. Christ has already given us our true identity, beloved children of God.

We don't work to earn God's favor; we work because we are free in Christ to serve our neighbor. That's the heart of Christian vocation: using our gifts and energy, not to build up our own name, but to bless others in the name of Jesus.

Whether you are busy in the office, cleaning the house, volunteering at church, or simply showing up for a friend, may you find joy in knowing your work is not in vain. It is part of God's good plan for your life and for the world.

"So, whether you eat or drink or whatever you do, do everything for the glory of God."
