Pastor's Peace

"My little children, let us not love in word, neither in tongue; but in deed and in truth." 1 John 3:18

As the leaves change and the air grows crisp, we find ourselves once again in the heart of autumn. October is a time of thanksgiving for the harvest, of preparing for the darker and colder days ahead—but for us, it's also a time to remember our roots.

October 31st marks Reformation Day, the day in 1517 when Martin Luther nailed his 95 Theses to the church door in Wittenberg. It was a bold act, not intended to divide the Church, but to call it back to the heart of the Gospel, the good news that we are saved by grace alone, through faith alone, in Christ alone. What began as a scholarly invitation to debate certain church practices became the spark that ignited a movement. But the Reformation was never meant to be about division or rebellion for its own sake; it was a call to return to the Gospel.

At its heart, the Reformation was about rediscovering the central truth of our faith: that we are justified by grace through faith, apart from works of the law (Romans 3:28). This truth, hidden beneath centuries of human tradition and ecclesiastical power, was like a buried treasure unearthed. Luther, and the Reformers with him, did not invent the Gospel, they recovered it. This truth remains just as powerful today as it was over 500 years ago. In a world full of performance-based acceptance and conditional love, we proclaim a message that runs counter to culture: we are loved, forgiven, and accepted; not because of what we've done, but because of what Christ has done for us.

We find for ourselves that there is much division in our world and a failed acceptance to see others for themselves and not necessarily as how we would expect them to be. Luther's movement was not about bringing about discord and dissention, it was about finding ways to bring his church into the life God had created. Many of us struggle with the fact it is difficult to hear other people's opinions and respect for them the place they come from, even when it does not necessarily align with what we believe. We are called to embrace our differences, not always having to agree, but to agree we each have our own beliefs which might not align.

One of the enduring legacies of the Reformation is the principle of ecclesia semper reformanda—"the Church must always be reformed." This doesn't mean constant

novelty or change for the sake of change. Rather, it means that we, as the body of Christ, must continually examine ourselves in light of the Word of God. Like the changing of the seasons, the Church must always be open to the Spirit's work of renewal and repentance.

In our own day, we face different challenges than those of Luther's time. The questions may have changed, but the need for Gospel clarity remains. We live in a world increasingly skeptical of truth, anxious about the future, and lonely in the crowd. What does the Reformation mean in such a world?

It means we continue to preach Christ crucified. It means we still baptize in the name of the Triune God. It means we still gather at the Lord's Table to receive His true body and blood for the forgiveness of our sins. It means we hold fast to Scripture as our authority, not human opinion. It means we remain a people shaped by grace alone, faith alone, and Scripture alone.

Reformation isn't only about Church history; it's about our story. Luther taught that every baptized Christian is a theologian, and every home is a "little church." So this October, consider the following:

Return to the Word: Let Scripture have the final say in your life. Open your Bible not just for information, but for transformation.

Lean into Grace: Reject the voices (internal and external) that tell you that you must earn God's favor. Christ has already done it all.

Live Vocationally: Whether you are a student, a parent, retired, working, or unemployed—God is at work through your daily tasks to serve your neighbor.

Worship Boldly: Participate in the means of grace, Word and Sacrament. That is where God has promised to meet us.

"Now faith us the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. For by it the people of old received their commendation. By faith we understand that the universe was created by the word of God, so that what is seen was not made our of things that are visible." Hebrews 11:1-3

Saint Paul's Congregational Council

St. Paul's Congregational Council currently has 10 voting members serving on Council. According to the approved constitution amendment, the Congregational Council must have at least 8 voting members with no more than 12 voting members serving a two (2) year term with eligibility of running for three (3) consecutive terms of two (2) years each for a total of six (6) years consecutively.

The Nominating Committee of St. Paul's Lutheran church is seeking nominations for five (5) voting members to fill five (5) seats. *Nominations will be accepted through December 31, 2025.*The Congregational Council currently has three (3) members whose **terms end in January 2026**.

- One member is running again for another two year term.
- Two members are coming off council. Seeking nominations for two (2) voting members to fill these two seats to serve a two (2) year term from January 25, 2026 to January 30, 2028.

In addition, to have the maximum of 12 voting members serving on council, seeking nominations for two (2) more voting members to serve a two (2) year term from January 25, 2026 to January 30, 2028.


